From the Pastor

The fun part of my job is taking youth to confirmation camp every August: campfires and silly songs; craft projects, games, and sharing our favourite Bible stories during morning sessions.

The much harder part of the job is stepping back and wrestling with some big-picture questions: why do parents struggle to get their children to church? What case can I make for Christianity at a time when kids have so many appealing alternatives? Why should young people commit themselves to spiritual things when their wider community views such commitments as quaint, obsolete, and even regressive?

The youth ask me questions like: None of my friends go to church, why should I? Why should I pray to God when I have no proof? If Jesus is so important, why doesn't anyone talk about him outside of church? My own daughter once asked me what God is for, after a fervent prayer of hers went unanswered. Likewise, my son, coming straight from a history class on World War II, asked me why the God of history is nonexistent in the story.

I don't have answers to these questions, but I want to keep wrestling with them and weighing the answers that matter to me. In confirmation programme we try to offer the youth reasons to pursue God in the context of a confusing world and an imperfect church. We remind them that the ground of Christianity is love. When our children need it (and they will), there is a love available

that nothing else on earth will ever explain, diminish, or destroy. It's a love that overcomes every barrier of suspicion and hatred we humans construct. It cleanses, blesses, and challenges us. It's a love worth living and dying for.

I encourage and invite you to take a look this fall and nurture your faith. Start with attending St. Philip's Fall BBQ on **Sunday, September 10** and welcome our new members, and then, get involved in one or more of the many fall programs we offer.

Finance Update

As summer draws to a close and we move towards fall please find below a financial update for the period of January to July 31, 2023.

In April I reported a net loss of \$8,276, unfortunately, the loss has since grown to \$20,564 as of the end of July.



With seven months (or 58%) of the year complete our spending is on budget with expenses of \$153,793 (58%) against income of \$133,229 or 51% of our approved budget of \$264,000. As noted in the last report with the reopening of the church for worship our expenses continue to track upward however, unfortunately our income to date is slightly lower than last year at this time.

As a result, at the end of July, we are currently running a deficit just over \$20,000 which is approximately \$12,000 further in the red than this time last year.




- Garden maintenance. Thanks to Sam and Judy Marcuson and John Brownlie for their dedication to keeping our gardens looking beautiful.
- We still have an ongoing honeybee problem. You may have noticed some holes in the ceiling of our Sanctuary. Most of the hive has been preserved and removed with a little more to do. You may also have noticed a smoky smell. There have been several applications to "smoke them out." More applications may be required. Work will be done on the outside on the soffit and drainpipe to close the bee access point. As well the roof will also be repaired to ensure there are no other access points as well as to repair two major cracks in the roof itself.
- Our Fellowship Hall is currently being rented to a summer children's sports camp, Jack of Sports, until 1st September. Thanks to the Cover Girls for giving up their space for the past two weeks.
- The Fellowship Hall will also be rented to the 90th Pathfinders on Tuesday evenings until June 2024 and to the African Violet Society on Friday evenings until June 2024.
- The property committee is also assessing other rental queries.

The Canadian Lutheran Anglican Youth (CLAY) Gathering took place in Waterloo on August 10 - 13. It was a privilege to lead a team of 5 youth (Marleah Roche and Liam Stewart from St. Philip's, Katie Kleiner from Redeemer Toronto, Sarah Wettlaufer and Kira Chemerys from Nith Valley Shared Ministry) and experience this gathering with them! They were given opportunities to figure out how they will live their faith and what faith looks like for them and their generation. As a team, we discussed refugees, racism, climate change, social justice, and seeing the humanity in all people.

The youth made many new friends from across Canada, engaged in worship, attended workshops, and heard from our keynote speakers, Rev. Aneeta Saroop and Rev. Nathan Fong. The theme was Ashes and Embers and the speakers shared stories of when their lives felt like vibrant fires with lots of new opportunities and activity. They shared ember-like experiences of opportunities coming to an end. They also vulnerably shared other harder moments of racism and family conflict when their lives felt like ashes. They always brought it back to the truth that God is with us in all of these stages and experiences.



Good Food Market



This summer I have had the privilege of working with a dedicated team of staff and volunteers at St Philip's to help with the coordination of two amazing community-based programs, the Neighbourhood Table and the Good Food Market.

The Good Food Market ran once a week at the Toronto Community Housing building located at 44 Willowridge Road. It aims to improve access to high quality food by alleviating the burdens associated with high grocery costs. Thanks to the funding the market receives, we were able to allocate thousands of dollars during the summer toward lowering the cost of fruits and vegetables as well as facilitating other activities to further engage the community.

The market offered recipe loot bags, children's activities, draws for grocery gift cards, as well as chef demonstrations and sampling. The ongoing heartfelt feedback from community members who took part in the market was an excellent reminder of the positive impact it had on the community. It was wonderful getting to know the residents at 44 Willowridge and I am so grateful to have been able to take part in the market with St. Philip's this summer.

Working with St. Philip's this summer has been such an exceptional experience for me as I've become exposed to different community engagement-based programs and have been introduced to people from all walks of life.

Seeing the value of these programs to people's lives first-hand has emphasized the need for their ongoing presence in the community and shines light on how important the work done by St. Philip's Lutheran Church really is.
